Using a pre-test/post-test factorial design, 395 young adult women were recruited to test the main and interactive effects of risk factors and message framing variables on processing of heart disease prevention information. This study was presented at an international Health Psychology conference (Orvieto, Italy) and received Honorable Mention for the John C. Hume Award for excellence in dissertation research from the Department of Health Policy and Management, Johns Hopkins School of Public Health. The main paper from this work was awarded an early-career health behavior research award from the American Academy of Health Behavior (March, 2006) and was published as a scientific article by the *American Journal of Health Behavior* (Nov/Dec, 2006).
